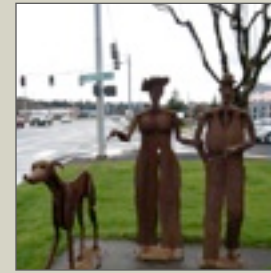

❖RAYMOND ON THE WILLAPA❖

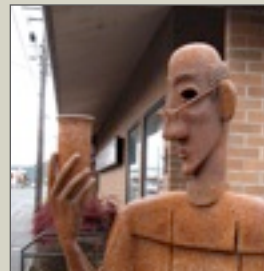
The guide you have just picked up is your very own ticket to a walking tour of the Art and History of Raymond, Washington. This tour covers a total of 2.8 miles starting from the South Side of Raymond to the Visitor Center located at 415 Commercial Street.



The first three pictures are located on highway 101 south of Raymond. The Native American Statues are made by Renee O'Conner. Some of the tribes native to the Willapa Harbor area are the Chinook, Chehalis, and Willapa Nations in addition to the Quinault and Shoalwater Bay tribes. The sea birds are some of the native species of Willapa Harbor. The birds were made by Joanne Jambor.

In and around Raymond resides a multitude of different species of animals. From Elk to Raccoons and Eagles to River Otters there is always some critter waiting for you to discover. These statues were created by Joanne Jambor.

These four statues represent the many statues who make up the collection lining the section of Highway 101 that runs parallel to Historic Downtown Raymond. These statues represent snapshots of everyday life in Raymond. These statues were created by Hans Nelson.



These two pictures are located in downtown Raymond. On the left is a Statue made by Hans Nelson located at the boat launch near the Carriage Museum. It depicts the local population of recreational Fishermen and women. The fish is as tall as a man representing not only the "epic fish story" but also the native river sturgeon. The statue on the right is one that depicts a Druggist. He stands outside the Sagen's Pharmacy downtown.
